The latest St Ayles Skiff, 'Fast Messenger', built by the men and women of the Warnambool St Ayles Skiff Club was launched with wonderful ceremony at the brilliant Warnambool Flagstaff Hill Marine precinct last Sunday.

■ ast Messenger, was first previewed ■ to the public at Portland's impressive Upwelling Festival the day before in brilliant sunshine, and a day of subsequent Whale Boat racing in the bay.

Fast Messenger was accompanied by sister boat from Goolwa, South Australia's John *Liddy*, in the parade and onshore display. The Rev Jim Barr, Welsh Church Melbourne and builders Chris and Alan, met up with us that evening back in Warnambool, in readiness for the big launch day on Sunday.

What a day Sunday was! John Liddy, Cariad lined up on their trailers with Fast Messenger under her drapes, ready for public unveiling and launching. Probably 100 people in attendance, and the superb Warnambool

coaxing off her trailer and into her natural environment. She looked resplendent in her new Aquacote livery, stylish professional signage, and 'FAST' outfitted crew!

Flagstaff Hill Marine sheltered lake and marine village setting was perfect for the event.

The next day saw a four boat regatta with Cariad, John Liddy, the newly launched Fast Messenger and Flagstaff Hill's resident 29'. five oar Whale boat, Flagstaff Hill.

The day saw many first time local rowers jumping into the boats. The rowing times confirmed what we had suspected. The experienced crewed times around the course in Flagstaff Hill were matched by scratch crews in the smaller St Ayles Skiffs.

Fast Messenger is the seventh St Ayles Skiff to be launched in Australia, with another six building and another six mooted. There are four building in WA, another in Tasmania, and another one in Warnambool. Four boats are on the water in NZ, and another six are in build.

We expect over 20 St Ayles Skiffs in the water in Australia in time for the March 2017 Wooden Boat Festival in Goolwa.

An Anzac St Ayles Coastal Rowing organisation is slowly but surely becoming a reality.

Another two St Avles Kits have just been ordered by the WA Naval Cadets, and should be in build by the time you read this.

In the last few weeks orders include Tammie Norrie 13'5" to Oliver in Victoria, Badger to Graham in Victoria, another St Ayles kit to the Bitterns rowing group in Franklin, Tasmania, and our new 10m Coorong Aurora kit to Leon in South Australia.

As we travelled through Victoria, trailing *John Liddv* on his brilliant new bright yellow trailer, capable of carrying three St Ayles Skiffs, en route to Warnambool we called in to deliver sails and to visit Ken MacMahon, who had been building the Penny Fee, a much larger and heavier constructed cousin of Guillemot and Tammie Norrie.

Ken had been with me when I demonstrated, with Roi Fuchs, from Marine Timbers, the Aquacote paint techniques we have developed, here in South Australia. The demo was a fraught day, hot wind and leaf litter dust blowing around, and seemingly impending rain. A climate controlled experiment, to be

sure, especially since the Wemyss Skiff we were painting was outside!

It was a tough gig, but Ken was sufficiently inspired to go home and start painting his Penny Fee.

I admit to being stunned when I walked into his workshop. His boat looked simply fabulous, as smooth, shiny, and as perfect as I have ever seen a paint job.

"Dead easy, when you get the hang of it," more or less describes Ken's description of his Aquacote experience. "Just used foam brushes, fast, great coverage and perfect finish."

Ken is a master boat builder, I like to call it, 'self apprenticed', and it shows.

And the final one, Peter Whiten's stunning kit build treatment of Iain Oughtred's sleek, slippery and surprisingly capable Acorn 15 design.
